The challenge

350,000 mothers and nearly 2 million babies die each year during birth. 99 % of these deaths occur in low resource settings.

Such inequity is found in no other area of health care, with mothers in developing countries having up to 500 times higher life time risk of dying giving birth.

In response to this the UN has established Millennium Development Goals number 4 and 5 to reduce child mortality by two thirds and maternal mortality by three quarters from 1990 to 2015.



The opportunity

Appropriately trained and equipped birth attendants can save over a million lives annually from the main killers at birth, asphyxia and postpartum hemorrhage.

Two new initiatives will facilitate effective training of many more health workers in basic emergency obstetric and newborn care.



Helping Babies Breathe was introduced in 2010 by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP). Its implementation is supported by an allliance with USAID, NIH, Save the Children, AAP and Laerdal as partners.

Helping Mothers Survive bleeding after birth is a complimentary program developed by Jhpiego, and affiliate of Johns Hopkins University, in collaboration with AAP and Laerdal.
